
The Lawrence and Nancy Golden Memorial Lecture in Mind-Body Medicine



Lawrence and Nancy Golden were married for 58 ½ years




- Lawrence H. Golden, M.D. (1921-2004) was a pioneer in mind-body medicine. A cardiologist, Dr. Golden believed that cardiovascular difficulties were, in part, the result of psychological and social concerns.
- Based upon this philosophy, Dr. Golden, in partnership with his wife Nancy Posmantur Golden (1925-2014), established the Lawrence & Nancy Golden Lectureship in Mind-Body Medicine to enrich the medical education of future doctors.



Mind-Body Medicine focuses on the interactions among the physical body, thoughts, beliefs, and emotions as related to health. For the Goldens, mind-body medicine also required a successful interaction between physician and patient.

Lawrence H. Golden earned a B.A. (1943) and M.D. (1946) from UB and was a fellow in cardiology at Tulane. Dr. Golden joined UB in 1950 in 1950 and became an outstanding teacher within the residency and medical education programs. A longtime Chair of the Dept. of Medicine and Chief of Cardiology at Millard Fillmore Hospital (now Kaleida Health) Dr. Golden also served as a Clinical Professor of Medicine at the UB School of Medicine.






Nancy Golden earned a B.A. at Wellesley College (1945) where she was Phi Beta Kappa, Magna Cum Laude, and a Durant scholar. She received her M.S.W. at UB's School of Social Work (1948). A family therapist, Nancy Golden worked at Child and Family Services for thirty years. Dr. and Mrs. Golden also spent years on the faculty of the Creative Education Foundation.



Nancy Golden, Leading a Social Work Group for Young Boys The Goldens' commitment to mind-body medicine was longstanding. Drawing upon Lawrence's expertise in cardiology and Nancy's in social work, they created a clinical program that combined health care, patient education, cardiovascular activity, and counseling for emotional well being. Their cardiac rehabilitation program, the first in Buffalo, was appropriately named "Walk and Talk." The Goldens emphasized the importance of social support and spirituality in the recovery from life threatening illness.


The Goldens and their "Walk and Talk" Program for Cardiac Rehabilitation
